**Dr. Charles Anderson:** Dr. Anderson is a Graduate of Willamette University, Union Theological Seminary and a doctorate from Columbia University in the Literature of Religion. He has a great interest in the religious quest, especially in the depth behind religious concepts, practises and symbols and the common humanity inherent in the different religions despite their many and varied expressions.

**Don Bennett:** Don has been a music educator for over 30 years supporting the development of many professional musicians and many life-long music lovers. He is a long-time member of BC and Canadian Music Educator's Associations. He has a degree from UBC as a trombonist and a MEd from U Vic with a major in instrumental conducting. He is also an active performer and has played with orchestras throughout the province. Currently assistant conductor of the Kamloops Brandenburg Orchestra and the Kamloops Community Concert Band

Jack Braaksma: Jack and Jane are film buffs who enjoy sharing great films with the KALS group. They have totally different tastes and views which makes the sessions insightful and fun.

**Dr. David Brandon:** David teaches theology at schools in Cameroon, the Philippines, and Trinidad and Tobago on an ongoing basis. He has a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture from the University of Guelph, a Master of Divinity from Central Baptist Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School.

**Sylvia Gropp:** Sylvia Gropp has a B.A. in archeology and geology and has participated in digs on First Nations reserves and at the B.C. Wildlife Park. She is currently pursuing a Master's degree with UBC focusing on museum education. For more than a decade, Sylvia has worked with the Kamloops Museum and Archives and enjoys teaching history to people of all ages. She has co-written a book with the museum and the Thompson Rivers History and Heritage Society called Kamloops: Trading Post to Tournament Capital

**Rick Howie:** Rick is a professional biologist who worked for 7 years as Chief Park Naturalist at various parks in central and eastern Canada and 16 years with BC Provincial Parks. He worked for 10 years as a Habitat Protection Biologist with the BC Ministry of Environment and has been a consulting biologist for the past 12 years after retiring. He has lived in Kamloops for 36 years and has specialized in birds over the years but has a broad interest in all aspects of natural history.

**Kim Jensen:** 'Helping people to help themselves' is her personal and professional mission. Kim's background is in nursing, natural energy healing and community capacity building. Over the course of these careers she developed skills in communication, interpersonal relationships, adult education, organizational development and planning. Kim recently completed education to be a Life Cycle Celebrant through the Celebrant Foundation and Institute.

Jane Kennon: Jane has a Master's Degree in Creative Writing. She is a retired teacher who taught Secondary School English and Writing for 29 years. Jane is also an avid horsewoman and hockey player and long-time KALS instructor.

**Joyce Klassen:** Born into a farming family that lived through the Depression- nothing was thrown away. Many Saturday Auctions with my Dad started the bug of hunting for treasures that continues to this day. Over many moves from Alberta to New Westminster, 70 Mile House, 100 Mile House and finally Kamloops, the search continues. While not an appraiser, I did operate an antique store for a number of years and continue to buy and sell at antique and collectible events. I know what sells and I am happy to share what I have learned with others.

**Roxanne L'Esperance:** Roxanne is a Prevention Service Provider with the BC Responsible and Problem Gambling Program serving Kamloops and the interior of BC for the last eight years. The region is made up of 30 communities including 15 who are Indigenous and she works with numerous organizations that serve the Indigenous population. Roxanne works with all age groups, offering gaming neutral presentations, workshops, information booths, and committee support. She is Métis from Saskatchewan and has lived in Kamloops since 1997.

**Sam Longiaru:** Sam's career path and the places he's lived is as winding as some of the roads he's motorcycled. He has a Ph.D. in geology, was a university teacher, a flying instructor, a flight school owner and operator and a bookkeeper and computer guy and likely many more things...a motorcycle mechanic comes to mind.

**Dr. David McKinnon:** David has a B.Sc. and Ph.D. in Chemistry from the University of Edinburgh, Scotland. In 1963 he immigrated to Canada. He was a post-doctoral fellow in Chemistry at Dalhousie University; taught Chemistry at the University of Manitoba where he received the Stanton teaching Award. He was an active researcher and authored or co-authored 74 refereed papers, two reviews and three book chapters. He enjoys Scottish Country Dancing, Stained glass, travel, gardening, genealogy, and is a board member of the BIG Little Science Centre.

**Wendy Marlow:** Executive Director of the Kamloops Hospice, Wendy was born and raised in Kamloops and a graduate of Cariboo College in Respiratory Therapy. She has worked over 20 years in management roles across the country with VitalAire, a homecare respiratory company.

**Rod Michell**: MA in English and Literary Arts (Oxford); Rod is a retired instructor who taught for over 30 years at TRU and other educational institutions. He is on the Board of the Kamloops Symphony Society.

**Dr. Ian Mitchell:** Ian works full time as an Emergency Doctor at RIH. He teaches evidence based medicine and research to trainees in the Kamloops Family Medicine Residency Program. Ian became interested in medical cannabis in the treatment of chronic pain, especially as a substitute for prescription opiates. He is a prescriber of cannabis plus a researcher into the effects of cannabis on PTSD.

first Birken Forest Buddhist Monastery near Pemberton, B.C. In 2001 he established Birken (also known by its Pali name 'Sitavana') in its final location just south of Kamloops, B.C.

### **KALS FALL 2016 MULTIPLE SESSION COURSE DESCRIPTIONS**

#### FM116: Come to the Concert: Preparing for Live Orchestral Music

"Come to the Concert" is a 10 week series of illustrated introductions to the music in each of the orchestral and chamber music concerts of the 2016-2017 KSO season. With the idea that knowledge and familiarity can help enrich any listener's enjoyment, you are invited to "come to the class," and, a few days later, to "Come to the Concert" itself. Each class is scheduled a few days before the performance, and, in addition to a brief overview of the structure of each work, classes will include information on composers, on the evolution of musical styles, and the growth of musical genres. As the KSO season does not schedule a concert every week, the classes in the non-concert weeks will provide opportunities for a variety of activities: to exchange reactions to the previous week's performance, to explore questions about aspects of the music and performance, and to develop more fully the musical and historical background that will increase our comfort and familiarity with classical music.

This year marks two significant milestones for the Kamloops Symphony Orchestra: first, a 40th Anniversary—40 continuous years of performing orchestral and chamber music to Kamloops and surrounding communities; second, the search for a new Music Director to replace long-time Director, Bruce Dunn. From the many applicants for the post four have been shortlisted, two women and two men. What makes this season a special time to "Come to the Concert" is that as part of the season-long selection process, each candidate will conduct one of the Masterworks Series orchestral concerts. Audience opinion of the candidates will be sought, and these classes may sharpen your judgement as you help determine who will direct the KSO in the coming years. **Concert tickets NOT included**.

As in the arduous trials of the journey through Hell in Inferno, Virgil remains Dante's guide, for there is much still for Dante to learn in his quest for spiritual self-knowledge. There is, moreover, still much hardship to be endured in this place where repentant sinners, inspired with hope of salvation, endure penance for their remaining sinful tendencies, but not punishment.

Like his Hell, Dante's Island of Purgatory is a carefully structured world that reflects both enduring spiritual truth and the social and political realities of Dante's own mediaeval Italian world. Whether or not you toiled through the extremes of Inferno, join us now on this still demanding (Purgatory is a steep mountain, after all), but more hopeful, stage of Dante's poetically imaginative journey that is rich in biblical, classical and historical allusion. FM716: St. Paul for the Perplexed – His Life, His Letters, His Story

Early Christians were at risk of persecution for their beliefs and Saul of Tarsus, a Jew, was devoted to exposing them in his early life. He became St. Paul the Apostle when on his way to Damascus to expose more Christian believers, the resurrected Jesus appeared to him in a vision. He was not one of the original disciples of Jesus, but after his conversion wrote the earliest literature we have from participants in the Christian movement. He founded various Christian communities and his letters to them promoted an admirable ethic far ahead of his time about the equality of people in social, gender and ethnicity issues not yet fully achieved in our time. Unfortunately, after Paul's death, writings in his name began to appear which negate (and were so intended) his egalitarian teachings. This series of lectures attempts to set the record straight and to give the historical Paul the respect he deserves.

#### FM816: A Vision for Growing Older – at any age

Until recently, most of us understood and accepted aging as a process of retirement, moving to a "seniors' residence", and a gradual decline and disengagement from life. Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi's book From Age-ing to Sage-ing© proposes a new model of late-life development called sage-ing, a process that associates old age with self-development and spiritual growth. Individuals learn to draw from the growth techniques of modern psychology and contemplative spiritual practices of the world's wisdom traditions. The concepts in From Age-ing to Sage-ing© are based on models of the traditional "wise elder" whose wisdom guided the social order for thousands of years, state-of-the-art breakthroughs in brain-mind and consciousness research, and the ecology movement, which urges us to live in harmony with the natural world.

The course will be based on the concepts discussed in Rabbi Zelman's book and will involve participants in widening and deepening their understanding of aging and elder-hood. We will explore looking at life in a new way as we grow older, spiritual practice that involves harvesting the wisdom of our lives, finding ways to transmit that wisdom as a legacy to future generations and how to give back through service while achieving our best selves as we age. No need to read the book to enjoy this program.

#### FS2016: BC Fruitlands – A Journey into Our Agriculture History

The B.C. Fruitlands, now the North Shore communities of North Kamloops, Brocklehurst, Westsyde and Noble Creek, was one of a number of ventures aimed at irrigating and the developing the interior of British Columbia for growing fruit in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Their goal appeared to be to transform the Interior of British Columbia into a major fruit production centre. However, many of these ventures struggled to maintain viability due to a variety of factors, including falls in market prices, the Great Depression, two world wars, and lower immigration to the province. This talk will provide a history of B.C. Fruitlands through the documents in the British Columbia Fruitlands collection, which focus on the early development and financial history of the British Columbia Fruitlands Company, the British Columbia Power & Irrigation Company and the North Kamloops Syndicate.
