#### KAMLOOPS ADULT LEARNERS SOCIETY

#### CONSTITUTION

- 1 Name: The name of the Society is "Kamloops Adult Learners Society"
- 2 **Purposes**: The purposes of the society are to:
  - 2.1 Provide educational opportunities for seniors in the Kamloops/Thompson region;
  - 2.2 Offer, administer and conduct classes for seniors in the Kamloops/Thompson region;
  - 2.3 Promote the physical and mental well-being and quality of life of seniors in the Kamloops/Thompson region;
  - 2.4 Promote the benefits of continuous learning for seniors in the Kamloops/Thompson region.

#### KAMLOOPS ADULT LEARNERS SOCIETY BYLAWS

# **Part 1 — Interpretation**

- 1 (1) In these bylaws, unless the context otherwise requires:
  - "directors" means the directors of the society for the time being;
  - "Society Act " means the Society Act of British Columbia from time to time in force and all amendments to it;
  - "registered address" of a member means the member's address as recorded in the register of members.
  - (2) The definitions in the *Society Act* on the date these bylaws become effective apply to these bylaws.
- 2 Words importing the singular include the plural and vice versa, and words importing a male person include a female person and a corporation.

# Part 2 — Membership

- 3 (1) A person 18 years or older may apply for membership in the society and on payment of the annual fee is a member.
  - (2) The membership year shall run from July 1 to June 30 of the following year.
- 4 Every member must uphold the constitution and comply with these bylaws.
- The amount of the annual membership dues must be determined at the annual general meeting of the society.

- 6 A person ceases to be a member of the society
  - (a) by delivery of his or her resignation in writing to the secretary of the society or mailing or delivering it to the address of the society,
    - (b) on his or her death,
    - (c) on being expelled, or
    - (d) on not paying membership dues for the current fiscal year.
- 7 (1) A member may be expelled by a special resolution of the members passed at a general meeting.
  - (2) The notice of special resolution for expulsion must be accompanied by a brief statement of the reasons for the proposed expulsion.
  - (3) The person who is the subject of the proposed resolution for expulsion must be given an opportunity to be heard at the general meeting before the special resolution is put to a vote.
- All members are in good standing except a member who has failed to pay his or her current annual membership fee, or any other subscription or debt due and owing by the member to the society, and the member is not in good standing so long as the debt remains unpaid.
- The society will carry on without purpose of gain for members and any income, profits or other accretions to the society shall be used in promoting the purposes of the society. This paragraph was previously unalterable.

## Part 3 — Meetings of Members

- General meetings of the society must be held at the time and place, in accordance with the *Society Act*, that the directors decide.
- Every general meeting, other than an annual general meeting, is an extraordinary general meeting.
- The directors may, when they think fit, convene an extraordinary general meeting.
- 13 (1) Notice of a general meeting must specify the place, day and hour of the meeting, and, in case of special business, the general nature of that business.
  - (2) The accidental omission to give notice of a meeting to, or the non-receipt of a notice by, any of the members entitled to receive notice does not invalidate proceedings at that meeting.

The annual general meetings of the society must be held at least once in every calendar year and not more than 15 months after the holding of the last preceding annual general meeting.

# Part 4 — Proceedings at General Meetings

- 15 Special business is
  - (a) all business at an extraordinary general meeting except the adoption of rules of order, and
  - (b) all business conducted at an annual general meeting, except the following:
    - (i) the adoption of rules of order;
    - (ii) the consideration of the financial statements;
    - (iii) the report of the directors;
    - (iv) the report of the auditor, if any;
    - (v) the election of directors;
    - (vi) the appointment of the auditor, if required;
    - (vii) the other business that, under these bylaws, ought to be conducted at an annual general meeting, or business that is brought under consideration by the report of the directors issued with the notice convening the meeting.
- 16 (1) Business, other than the election of a chair and the adjournment or termination of the meeting, must not be conducted at a general meeting at a time when a quorum is not present.
  - (2) If at any time during a general meeting there ceases to be a quorum present, business then in progress must be suspended until there is a quorum present or until the meeting is adjourned or terminated.
  - (3) A quorum is 10 members present or a greater number that the members may determine at a general meeting.
- If within 15 minutes from the time appointed for a general meeting a quorum is not present, the meeting, if convened on the requisition of members, must be terminated, but in any other case, it must stand adjourned to the same day in the next week, at the same time and place, and if, at the adjourned meeting, a quorum is not present within 30 minutes

- from the time appointed for the meeting, the members present constitute a quorum.
- Subject to bylaw 19, the president of the society, the vice president or, in the absence of both, one of the other directors present must preside as chair of a general meeting.
- 19 If at a general meeting
  - (a) there is no president, vice president or other director present within 15 minutes after the time appointed for holding the meeting, or
  - (b) the president and all the other directors present are unwilling to act as the chair,

the members present must choose one of their number to be the chair.

- 20 (1) A general meeting may be adjourned from time to time and from place to place, but business must not be conducted at an adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place.
  - (2) When a meeting is adjourned for 10 days or more, notice of the adjourned meeting must be given as in the case of the original meeting.
  - (3) Except as provided in this bylaw, it is not necessary to give notice of an adjournment or of the business to be conducted at an adjourned general meeting.
- 21 (1) A resolution proposed at a meeting need not be seconded, and the chair of a meeting may move or propose a resolution.
  - (2) In the case of a tie vote, the chair does not have a casting or second vote in addition to the vote to which he or she may be entitled as a member, and the proposed resolution does not pass.
- 22 (1) A member in good standing present at a meeting of members is entitled to one vote.
  - (2) Voting is by show of hands.
  - (3) Voting by proxy is not permitted.

### Part 5 — Directors and Officers

- 23 (1) The directors may exercise all the powers and do all the acts and things that the society may exercise and do, and that are not by these bylaws or by statute or otherwise lawfully directed or required to be exercised or done by the society in a general meeting, but subject, nevertheless, to
  - (a) all laws affecting the society,
  - (b) these bylaws, and
  - (c) rules, not being inconsistent with these bylaws, that are made from time to time by the society in a general meeting.
  - (2) A rule, made by the society in a general meeting, does not invalidate a prior act of the directors that would have been valid if that rule had not been made.
- 24 (1) The directors of the society shall be: president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, past president, chairs of standing committees and one or more other persons who are the directors at large.
  - (2) The number of directors must be 5 or a greater number determined from time to time at a general meeting.
- 25 (1) The directors must retire from office at each annual general meeting when their successors are elected.
  - (2) Separate elections must be held for each office to be filled.
  - (3) An election may be by acclamation, otherwise it must be by ballot.
  - (4) If a successor is not elected, the person previously elected or appointed continues to hold office.
- 26 (1) The directors may at any time and from time to time appoint a member as a director to fill a vacancy in the directors.
  - (2) A director so appointed holds office only until the conclusion of the next annual general meeting of the society, but is eligible for re-election at the meeting.
- 27 (1) If a director resigns his or her office or otherwise ceases to hold office, the remaining directors must appoint a member to take the place of the former director.

- (2) An act or proceeding of the directors is not invalid merely because there are less than the prescribed number of directors in office.
- The members may, by special resolution, remove a director before the expiration of his or her term of office, and may elect a successor to complete the term of office.
- A director must not be remunerated for being or acting as a director but a director must be reimbursed for all expenses necessarily and reasonably incurred by the director while engaged in the affairs of the society.

# **Part 6 — Proceedings of Directors**

- 30 (1) The directors may meet at the locations they think fit to conduct business, adjourn and otherwise regulate their meetings and proceedings, as they see fit.
  - (2) The directors may from time to time set the quorum necessary to conduct business, and unless so set the quorum is a majority of the directors then in office.
  - (3) The president is the chair of all meetings of the directors, but if at a meeting the president is not present within 15 minutes after the time appointed for holding the meeting, the vice president must act as chair, but if neither is present the directors present may choose one of their number to be the chair at that meeting.
  - (4) A director may at any time, and the secretary, on the request of a director, must convene a meeting of the directors.
- 31 (1) The directors may delegate any, but not all, of their powers to committees consisting of the director or directors as they think fit.
  - (2) A committee so formed in the exercise of the powers so delegated must conform to any rules imposed on it by the directors, and must report every act or thing done in exercise of those powers to the earliest meeting of the directors held after the act or thing has been done.
- A committee must elect a chair of its meetings, but if no chair is elected, or if at a meeting the chair is not present within 15 minutes after the time appointed for holding the meeting, the directors present who are members of the committee must choose one of their number to be the chair of the meeting.
- The members of a committee may meet and adjourn as they think proper.

- For a first meeting of directors held immediately following the appointment or election of a director or directors at an annual or other general meeting of members, or for a meeting of the directors at which a director is appointed to fill a vacancy in the directors, it is not necessary to give notice of the meeting to the newly elected or appointed director or directors for the meeting to be constituted, if a quorum of the directors is present.
- A director who may be absent temporarily from British Columbia may send or deliver to the address of the society a waiver of notice, which may be by letter, fax or e-mail, of any meeting of the directors and may at any time withdraw the waiver, and until the waiver is withdrawn,
  - (a) a notice of meeting of directors is not required to be sent to that director, and
  - (b) any and all meetings of the directors of the society, notice of which has not been given to that director, if a quorum of the directors is present, are valid and effective.
- 36 (1) Questions arising at a meeting of the directors and committee of directors must be decided by a majority of votes.
  - (2) In the case of a tie vote, the chair does not have a second or casting vote.
- A resolution proposed at a meeting of directors or committee of directors need not be seconded, and the chair of a meeting may move or propose a resolution.
- A resolution in writing, signed by all the directors and placed with the minutes of the directors, is as valid and effective as if regularly passed at a meeting of directors.

### Part 7 — Duties of Officers

- 39 (1) The president presides at all meetings of the society and of the directors.
  - (2) The president is the chief executive officer of the society and must supervise the other officers in the execution of their duties.
- The vice president must carry out the duties of the president during the president's absence.
- The secretary must do the following:
  - (a) conduct the correspondence of the society;
  - (b) issue notices of meetings of the society and directors;
  - (c) keep minutes of all meetings of the society and directors;

- (d) have custody of all records and documents of the society except those required to be kept by the treasurer;
- (e) send the society annual report and filing fee.

### 42 The treasurer must

- (a) keep the financial records, including books of account, necessary to comply with the *Society Act*, and Income Tax Act;
- (b) render financial statements to the directors, members and others when required;
- (c) be one of the directors as designated signing officers, of which any two are required signatures;
- (d) receive and record gifts, bequests, funds and property, and hold, invest, administer and distribute funds and property for the purposes of the society, as are authorized for registered charities under the provisions of the Income Tax Act.
- 43 (1) The offices of secretary and treasurer may be held by one person who is to be known as the secretary treasurer.
  - (2) If a secretary treasurer holds office, the total number of directors must not be less than 5 or the greater number determined at the general meeting.
- In the absence of the secretary from a meeting, the directors must appoint another person to act as secretary at the meeting.

## Part 8 — Borrowing

- In order to carry out the purposes of the society the directors may, on behalf of and in the name of the society, raise or secure the payment or repayment of money in the manner they decide, and in particular, but without limiting that power, by the issue of debentures.
- A debenture must not be issued without the authorization of a special resolution.
- The members may, by special resolution, restrict the borrowing powers of the directors, but a restriction imposed expires at the next annual general meeting.

## Part 9 - Financial Review

The directors shall periodically arrange a financial review, and must do so when the person holding the office of treasurer changes.

- The directors shall appoint an individual who is familiar with normal accounting practices, and who is not a current director of the society, to conduct the financial review.
- 50. The financial review appointee shall review the accounts of the treasurer, attest that these are correct, and sign the annual financial report to be presented to the society at its annual general meeting.

#### Part 10 — Notices to Members

- A notice may be given to a member by e-mail, personally or by mail to the member at the member's registered address.
- A notice sent by mail is deemed to have been given on the second day following the day on which the notice is posted, and in proving that notice has been given, it is sufficient to prove the notice was properly addressed and put in a Canadian post office receptacle.
- 53 (1) Notice of a general meeting must be given to every member shown on the register of members on the day notice is given.
  - (2) No other person is entitled to receive a notice of a general meeting.

### Part 11 — Bylaws

- On being admitted to membership, each member is entitled access to a copy of the constitution and bylaws of the society from the Kamloops Adult Learners Society website or attend the office to request a printed copy.
- These bylaws must not be altered or added to except by special resolution.

## Part 12 - Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution or winding up of the society, the funds and assets of the society remaining after the satisfaction of its debits and liabilities, shall be given or transferred to such organizations or organizations with similar purposes in British Columbia, as may be determined by the members of the society at the time of dissolution or winding up provided that such organization shall be a registered charity recognized by Canada Revenue Agency as being qualified as such under the provisions of the Income Tax Act of Canada. If effect cannot be given to the aforesaid provisions, then such funds shall be given or transferred to a suitable level of local government. This paragraph was previously unalterable.
