The way we elect MLAs determines how government policies and decisions reflect the priorities of voters in a representative democracy. The electoral system has a major influence on the composition of the Legislature. Consequently, the voting system itself plays an important role in determining how well government reflects the actual preferences of voters, with farreaching implications for all areas of public policy.

The upcoming referendum asks whether British Columbians wish to shift from our current First Past the Post to a more proportional system. Relying on evidence from academic studies and real-world experience, this presentation by Fair Vote Kamloops (a non-partisan, grassroots group advocating for electoral reform) provides thought-provoking comparisons between the existing system and proportional representation. Mind, Mood, Microbes, and Immunity

A well-functioning immune system is critical to human health and survival. Our immune systems protect us against invasion by life-threatening agents such as viruses, bacteria, and other micro-organisms, and destroy cancer cells as they arise in the body. However, there are many events that affect immune function and thereby reduce its protective effects. One of the most powerful immunological modulators is stress – both physical and psychological. In this presentation Dr. Joneja discusses how different types of psychological stressors affect the immune response, and how these events impact the body's ability to survive threats to its well-being. Although a major function of immune protection is destruction of potentially disease-causing micro-organisms, we depend on certain microbial strains for our well-being. A balance between the immune system and harmless organisms in the digestive tract (the microbiome) is essential for optimal health.

Bill C-31 and the Rights of Indigenous Women

Generations of Aboriginal women and their children have been subjected to discrimination from the Indian Act of 1876 and it continues to do so today despite amendments. Federal law in the late 1800s defined a status Indian solely on the basis of paternal lineage - an Indian was a male Indian, the wife of a male Indian, or the child of a male Indian.

From 1869 until 1985 (116 years), if an Indian woman married a non-Indian man, she and the children of the marriage were

From 1869 until 1985 (116 years), if an Indian woman married a non-Indian man, she and the children of the marriage were denied Indian status. In 1985, the Act was amended by the passage of Bill C-31 to remove discrimination against women, to be consistent with section 15 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. However there remain significant issues. This presentation will provide a greater knowledge of the long struggle and of the current issues.

Two Medieval Tales: The Epic of Beowulf and Sir Gawain and the Green Knight

Do any of these seem familiar? —an alliance of comrades on a mission to overcome evil; a "human" creature that haunts the margins of society; a vengeful dragon jealously guarding a hoard of treasure; a wise ruler dying in defence of his people. If they sound like J.R.R. Tolkien in The Hobbit or The Lord of the Rings it's because, in a way, they are. They are all elements in the Old English epic Beowulf, a story Tolkien knew well and which was one of the shaping forces of his imagination. In this course we will read this 8th Century epic-heroic narrative in its own right (in a modern version). We will examine the picture it presents of Germanic (as opposed to ancient Greek) heroic culture, and explore its values and world view, ones that are still a part of literary consciousness today.

But wait - there's more. Some six centuries after Beowulf, more or less in Chaucer's time, there is the captivating poetic narrative, Sir Gawain and the Green Knight. Wonderfully descriptive, it recounts the many trials that face King Arthur's most virtuous knight, alone in a world that is both mythical and magical but that remains psychologically real. Read along with Beowulf, it will allow us to experience some of the ways society, ideas, literature and religion evolved over the centuries from early to later medieval times.

Dr. Clark will consider the transition from a fossil fuel-based society to one based mostly on electricity produced by solar, wind and nuclear power and will indicate how difficult, if not impossible, this will be over the short term (100 – 200 years). A major hurdle is that fossil fuel provides most of the materials needed for modern infrastructure, including those required for construction of renewable energy systems. Today, fossil fuel provides the materials and means to grow food for a population of 7.4 billion people.

Class 1 will examine the conditions and material needs for evolution of life on Earth and how these dictate today's material requirements for high intensity agriculture. Class 2 will explain why the rate of introduction of solar and wind is slow and how renewable energy is not possible without materials from fossil fuel (or biomass).
