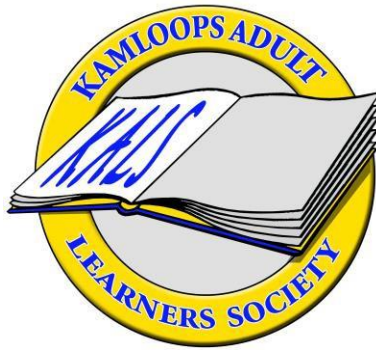

Global Impacts of Sustainable Energy

This class will continue to build on work presented in Dr. Clarke's 2 fall lectures, but is a stand alone session that does not require participants to have attended those talks. Dr. Clark will consider the transition from a fossil fuel-based society to one based mostly on electricity produced by solar, wind, and nuclear power and will indicate how difficult, if not impossible, this will be over the short term (100 – 200 years). A major hurdle is that fossil fuel provides most of the materials needed for modern infrastructure, including those required for construction of renewable energy systems. Today, fossil fuel provides the materials and means to grow food for a population of 7.4 billion people.

Stalinism & the Gulag: Soviet Prison Camps in Comparative Perspective

Are you interested in Russian history? Dr. Bell will examine Stalin's notorious system of prison/concentration camps and explore their origins, purpose, the experiences of prisoners and personnel, and the place of the Gulag in a global, comparative history of both the concentration camp and the modern prison. What role did the Gulag play in Stalinism? How is it similar to or different from other concentration camps? What is the impact of the Gulag on present-day Russia?
